If you Member Handbook and/or need Emergency Preparedness Guide, they can be picked up from MS.

Scam Tip of the Week: Electronic Theft
There are several ways thieves can steal from you. One of the most prevalent ways is to remove funds from an account you hold through electronic means. Unless all of your money is kept under your mattress, every account with your name on it can be accessed electronically.

Institutions go to great lengths to keep their systems safe, but every computer system is susceptible to theft because every system is connected to the internet. If a thief is smart or clever enough, they will

find a way to access your money.

The sooner you discover a problem, the more likely it is that you'll be able to get your stolen money back. Check every account you hold — bank account, Paypal savings account, credit card account, Cash App account etc. — regularly to make sure no unauthorized. account, etc. — regularly to make sure no unauthorized activity has appeared. Some even suggest to check daily. If you see anything suspicious, contact the account holder immediately. It may require you to fill out forms, or even to close the account. It is tedious, but necessary but necessary.


