Solar Eclipse 101

On April 8 we will experience a once-in-a-generation solar eclipse. Our area will see a partial eclipse of about 75% coverage at the midpoint and, for our location, the eclipse will start at 1:45 p.m. local time and end at 4:18 p.m. local time. If you would like to have a better understanding of what is occurring, join our local expert Steve Reas on March 8, at 1:00 p.m. as he discusses the event and take a look at it yourself with his binoculars that are equipped with a solar filter that is set up for direct viewing (do not use regular binoculars!). Steve will also be bringing his large box pinhole camera. After the presentation, grab your eclipse glasses (free while supplies last) and head outside to watch the show!

The Mystery of the Perfect Temperature
After many years of attempting to solve the mystery of the perfect temperature in the church sanctuary, the

mystery remains unsolved.

Due to numerous comments and expressions of concern it is evident that maintaining the perfect temperature setting in the church sanctuary — a temperature that is comfortable to all — is an impossible achievement. On the very same day that some are too warm, others are too cool.

At present, the thermostat is set at 74 degrees too cool for some and too warm for others. The perfect temperature for everyone seems

unachievable goal.

There are at least a couple of factors that may affect how warm or cool you feel. First, where you sit can affect your comfort, so be open to the idea of sitting in a different location. Be aware that the two center rows of pews tend to be more in the direct flow of the air conditioning. Those sitting towards the center of the sanctuary likely will feel cooler. On the other hand, the two outside rows (those nearest the walls) tend to have less direct flow of the air, and therefore, it feels less cool in those seats. Perhaps, choosing a strategic seat location may assist in making you more comfortable.

A second factor is how we dress. Sharing the very same room are those who are dressed in a suit coat and tie, while others are wearing sleeveless tops. Also, some are "hot-natured"; others are "coldnatured". The challenge is very real! Please feel free to bring a sweater in case you are too cool, and also to remove your jacket if you are too warm. And pray for comfort!

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!"

Member Services Tip of the Week Every weekend a member of the ACV management team is assigned to be available for calls from the IC should there be a situation that needs a coordinated response on behalf of the Village. The IC staff will direct the call to the Administrator on Call when necessary.

Scam Tip of the Week:

Tech Support Scam
Scammers may call you directly on the phone and pretend to be representatives of a tech company. They might even spoof the caller ID so that it displays a legitimate support phone number from a trusted company. They'll probably ask you to install applications that give them remote access to your device. Using remote access, these experienced scammers can misrepresent normal system messages as signs of problems.

Scammers might also initiate contact displaying fake error messages on websites you visit, displaying support numbers and enticing you to call. They may also put your browser in full screen mode and display pop-up messages that won't go away, apparently locking your browser. These fake error messages aim to scare you into calling their "technical support hotline".

When you engage with the scammers, they can offer fake solutions for your "problems" and ask for payment in the form of a one-time fee or subscription to a purported support service.

Microsoft's tips for staying safe:

- Microsoft does not send unsolicited email messages or make unsolicited phone calls to request personal or financial information, or to provide technical support to fix your computer. If you didn't ask us to, we won't call you to offer support.
- If a pop-up or error message appears with a phone number, don't call the number. Error and warning messages from Microsoft never include a phone number.
- Microsoft will never ask that you pay for support in the form of cryptocurrency like Bitcoin, or gift
- Download software only from official Microsoft partner websites or the Microsoft Store. Be wary of downloading software from third-party sites, as some of them might have been modified without the author's knowledge to bundle malware and other threats.
- Use Microsoft Edge when browsing the internet. It blocks known support scam sites using Microsoft Defender SmartScreen. Also, Microsoft Edge can stop pop-up dialog loops used by these attackers.

SIGNS OF STROKE: FAST

As we age, we develop all types of illnesses. One of the deadliest and most silent is a stroke. A stroke can be caused by a brain bleed, an irregular heart pattern, high blood pressure, diabetes, or heart disease. Signs of a stroke: Remember FAST. Does one side of the Face droop? Does one Arm drift downward when both are raised? Is Speech strange or slurred when speaking? If you see one of these signs, don't waste any Time. Call your emergency number right away. Other signs might include sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm, or leg — especially on one side of the body — sudden confusion, trouble speaking, or understanding speech; sudden problems seeing in one eye or both eyes; sudden dizziness, loss of balance or coordination, or trouble walking; and sudden severe headache with no known cause. Other danger signs that may occur include double vision, drowsiness, and nausea or vomiting. Stroke strikes fast.


