## VETERANS HEALTH CARE

The Joseph Maxwell Cleland and Robert Joseph Dole Memorial Veterans Benefits and Health Care Improvement Act of 2022 was signed into law on Dec. 29, 2022. Section 101 of the Cleveland-Dole Act expands eligibility for VA hospital care, medical services, and nursing home care for veterans of WWII. Our records indicate that you may be eligible for these benefits, and we urge you to apply for enrollment in VA health care, even if you were previously not approved due to your income level.

Do you have a question about the Village you think others would also like to ask? Did you see something curious or hear something you'd like confirmed? Q: What were the 110th Anniversary Capital Campaign projects announced at the Founder's Day celebration?

A: Two buildings are part of the new capital campaign. The first is a new general services center, which will eventually house Maintenance, Grounds and Housekeeping in one location. The new building will be built in stages on Buck Rogers Drive where the Pa Agner Farm Center is currently located. It will include offices, meeting spaces, supply storage, warehouse space, and vehicle bays.

The other building included is one ACV has been raising funds to build for a while: the Johnson Hall Assisted Living facility. Due to unforeseen circumstances, this project was placed on hold, and over time, the cost of this new building has increased substantially, requiring additional funds.

Besides the two buildings, another area of focused fundraising is toward campus replanting and restoration. Hurricane Idalia wreaked havoc on the
natural beauty of Dowling Park. ACV is seeking funds to replant trees and provide landscaping to re-beautify the campus.
