VETERANS HEALTH CARE

The Joseph Maxwell Cleland and Robert Joseph Dole Memorial Veterans Benefits and Health Care Improvement Act of 2022 was signed into law on Dec. Care 29, 2022. Section 101 of the Cleveland-Dole Act expands eligibility for VA hospital care, medical services, and nursing home care for veterans of WWII. Our records indicate that you may be eligible for these benefits, and we urge you to apply for enrollment in VA health care, even if you were previously not approved due to your income level.


Eating the Right Foods
