AD VALOREM TAX EXEMPTION SIGN-UP - RENTAL RESIDENTS ONLY -Tuesday, Feb. 13 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon and 1:00-4:00 p.m.

Wednesday, Feb. 14 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon Old Pavilion Room

Florida statutes allow rental residents of homes for the aged to claim a Homestead Exemption on their apartment or home. Claiming this exemption will reduce the amount of Ad Valorem taxes you are charged on your rental property. To file for this exemption you must sign and have notarized an Affidavit for Ad Valorem Tax Exemption Form. These forms MUST be filled out EVERY year. Even if you filled one out last year, you must fill one out again this year to continue to get your exemption. Married couples who reside in the same residence are required to provide both signatures (please come when both spouses are available). These forms must be submitted to the Property Appraiser's office by Feb. 28, 2024.

Residents of DH, CH and POP are NOT included.

To assist you in filling out these forms, а member of the Finance Department and a notary will be available in the OPR on Feb. 13, 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon and 1:00-4:00 p.m., and on Feb. 14., 9:00 a.m.-12:00 noon.

"Who besides the IRS is seeing this form?" you may ask. The answer is whoever wants to see it. The IRS requires all nonprofits like ACV to make public their three most recent Form 990 or 990-PF annual returns and all related supporting documents.

Thank you to all of you who take the time each month to report your ACV volunteer hours. The number we reported to Finance this time around was 157 individuals, by the way. That's a good number. Would you like someone to check on you every day? In CH, DH, Wilson Gardens and PV, a daily check

day? In CH, DH, Wilson Gardens and RV, a daily checkin is required to make sure everyone is safe and sound. Those living elsewhere on campus (and members living off campus) are left up to their own devices. Sometimes neighbors work out a signal to let each other know the other is safe. Even if your health is fine, and you have no problem taking care of yourself, having that extra safety net in case of some unforeseen circumstance might make the difference between life and death.

One of the services ACV makes available is the Reassurance Caller program. If you sign up for this service, someone will call you on the phone number you provide every morning. The call can be as short as "Good morning, how are you today?" "I'm fine, thank you." "OK, good-bye." In some cases, however, reassurance callers develop friendships with those they call, and the calls are a time to chat. It's up to you call, and the calls are a time to chat. It's up to you.

If you are interested in having a reassurance caller check on you daily, call MS. There is no charge for this service.

Member Services Tip of the Week Did you know ACV has an Obituary Line? The phone number is 208-1772 and is listed on the first page the Village Telephone Directory. In the case of the death of an ACV member, once the information is verified, a message is recorded and can be accessed by calling that number.

Scam Tip of the Week: Imposter Scams You get a call or an email. It might say you've won a

prize. It might seem to come from a government official. Maybe it seems to be from someone you know — your grandchild, a relative or a friend. Or maybe it's from someone you feel like you know, but you haven't met in person — say, a person you met online who you've been writing to.

Whatever the story, the request is the same: wire money to pay taxes or fees, or to help someone you care about. But is the person who you think it is? Is there an emergency or a prize? Judging by the complaints to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the answer is no. The person calling you is pretending to be someone else.

Here's what you can do:

- 1. Stop. Check it out before you wire money to anyone. Call the person, the government agency, or someone else you trust. Get the real story. Then decide what to do. No government agency will ever ask you to wire money.
- 2. Pass this information on to a friend. You may not have gotten one of these calls or emails, but the chances are you know someone who has.

Knowing facts about something is much different than living what we know. The teachers of the law had much knowledge, which is good. Today, there may be many people who have much knowledge about God's Word, but that's as far as it goes. The knowledge is not put into practice. To have much knowledge about a subject and not put it to practice is fruitless. People noticed a difference in Jesus because he was not only a teacher of the law, but Jesus was — is — the living word of God (John 1:1).

Thirdly, when ducks approach humans to be fed, they can leave droppings in locations where humans also walk such as sidewalks.

According to sugarlandtx.gov, "If you care about ducks and geese, do not feed them. They can live longer, healthier lives by relying on natural food sources such as aquatic plants, seeds, grasses, and insects rather than taking handouts from well-meaning humans."




