In an effort to reduce the cost of printing the weekly *Friendly Neighbor News*, ACV uses abbreviations and acronyms throughout. You can find a list of those used to describe locations around the Village on the front page of this FNN.

Scam Tip of the Week: County Records/Deed Scam

Order forms from County Records Office, LLC out of Tampa, Florida, offering to send copies of recorded deeds for a \$98 (or some similar amount) service fee are being received. These forms are a scam.

In Suwannee County, the Official Records Division of the Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller is responsible for maintaining property records, such as deeds, mortgages, liens, notices of commencement, declarations of condominiums, judgments, and plats. The documents are categorized based on name, document type, recording date, consideration amount, parcel ID, and address.

With the indexing information above, these records can be accessed online through the county's Official Records Search database at <http://records.suwgov.org/landmarkweb>, where document images can be viewed and printed with an Adobe Reader.

Aside from the online method, copies of records can be requested by visiting the office at 200 South Ohio Ave. in Live Oak or by submitting a mail-in request along with the requirements and associated fees. Fees include \$1.00 per page for copies and \$2.00 per document for certification. Additional charges may apply for services like mailing. For the complete fee structure, payment methods, and further details on obtaining records, contact the office at (386) 362-0500.

In writing about the different types of grass that you see as you walk in the neighborhood, I found out just how much I don't know about grass!

There are at least eight zoysian species. Zoysia grass is a warm-season variety, growing most during spring, summer or fall. It is a hardy and forgiving grass. Its excellent weather tolerance and adaptability allow it to thrive in various soil conditions. Whether you face challenges like deep shade, total sunlight exposure, drought, or salty soils, you can hardly make a mistake when you opt for zoysia grass for your lawn. Using zoysia grass means less mowing, less watering, less fertilization, and less pest control than many other grass types.

Bermuda grass grows well in hot locations because it is heat-, drought-, and salt-tolerant and is best suited for Hardiness Zones 6 through 11, in lawns with a soil pH of 6 to 6.5. This grass also requires more maintenance, like watering and weeding, to keep healthy. You'll also need to mow your lawn frequently to keep it about one to one-and-a-half inches tall. Bermuda grass will not grow well if your lawn is shady.

Perennial ryegrass is a cool-season lawn grass, is a fast grower, and is a good companion to other grasses and seed blends. It is low maintenance with many built-in resistances to pests and diseases. It has a few downsides, like patchy growth or difficulty handling shade or higher temperatures, but its pluses outweigh its minuses. Perennial ryegrass is an excellent choice in southern climates as an option for keeping lawns green in winter. Happy spring!
