RAPID FIBER

I am pleased to report that Rapid Fiber, a wholly owned subsidiary of Suwannee Valley Electric Cooperative, has begun to install the infrastructure to provide fiber-optic, high-speed internet to the campus.

Currently there is not a timeline for completion, but you may see crews on campus from both Rapid Fiber Internet and Suwannee Valley Electric Cooperative working on the install. These may include teams and vehicles from the following:

- SVEC,
- Rapid Fiber Internet,
- Bigham,
- EnterSource, and
- Conexon.

Kinetic, also known as Windstream, has also inquired about providing high-speed, fiber-optic service on the campus. There is no known timeline associated with Kinetic, but you may see their crews as well.

ACV will invite both companies to address the membership and share information about their services as the buildout progresses.

It is exciting to have this new option available, and as more details and information become available, we will share them with you.

- Pool passes are the property of ACV and may be revoked if rules and regulations are not adhered to.
- Persons without a pass may swim only as the guest of a pass holder or ACV member when accompanied by the pass holder or member.

Cost of Passes:

- Family Season Pass \$50
- Individual Season Pass \$25
- Month Pass \$20
- Weekly Pass \$10
- Day Pass \$5.00
- Replacement of a lost pass \$5.00

Passes may be purchased at the Village Lodge office.

Supervision at the Pool:

- Children under 13 must be accompanied by an adult.
- An adult over the age of 18 may supervise children at the pool when the lifeguard is notified by the parents of the children. Lifeguards cannot babysit your children. They already have the responsibility to all swimmers using the pool.
- Lifeguards may ask children under 13 to leave the pool if they are not being supervised.
- When the lifeguard is on duty, he/she will enforce all rules and can dismiss anyone from the pool area who does not observe his/her instructions and the rules as posted.

Scam Tip of the Week: Imposter Scams

You get a call or an email. It might say you've won a prize. It might seem to come from a government official. Maybe it seems to be from someone you know — your grandchild, a relative or a friend. Or maybe it's from someone you feel like you know, but you haven't met in person — say, a person you met online who you've been writing to.

Whatever the story, the request is the same: wire money to pay taxes or fees, or to help someone you care about. But is the person who you think it is? Is there an emergency or a prize? Judging by the com-

plaints to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the answer is no. The person calling you is pretending to be someone else.

Here's what you can do:

1. Stop. Check it out before you wire money to anyone. Call the person, the government agency, or someone else you trust. Get the real story. Then decide what to do. No government agency will ever ask you to wire money.
2. Pass this information on to a friend. You may not have gotten one of these calls or emails, but the chances are you know someone who has.

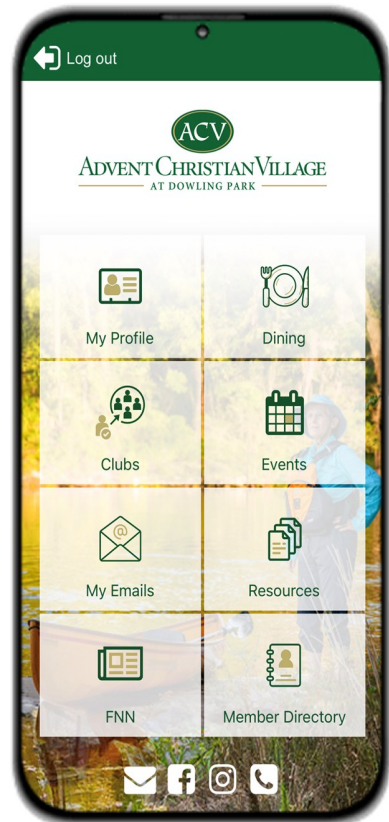
