#### SHUTTLE SCHEDULE CHANGE **UPDATED**

Prior to the pandemic, ACV's shuttle bus drove a circuit around the Village with scheduled stops every five minutes. This schedule served ACV well for many years. When shuttle service was restarted after the height of the pandemic, the shuttle was on-call in order to load and unload passengers as quickly as possible to limit possible exposure. Even as we have exited the pandemic and adjusted to our "new normal", we have continued to keep the shuttle available by phone call to provide flexibility. Lately, however, the amount of use and the unpredictability of the on-call system have resulted in some frustration felt by both members and ACV administration.

In order to provide you with better campus transportation service by adding some predictability to the daily weekday shuttle schedule, a hybrid shuttle bus schedule will be followed beginning Monday, Dec. 4. Every 30 minutes, the new schedule includes both regularly scheduled stops and periods of time where the shuttle may fit in unscheduled stops. The scheduled stops will take precedence over unscheduled stops, but, hopefully, the limited or accommodate everyone better. on-call availability

The following is what to expect when the new weekday bus schedule begins:

- The shuttle schedule will begin at 8:05 and end at
- Beginning at 8:05 a.m., the shuttle will arrive at CH every 30 minutes (8:05, 8:35, 9:05, etc.)
- Beginning at 8:10 a.m., the shuttle will arrive at DH every 30 minutes (8:10, 8:40, 9:10, etc.)

  UPDATE: Beginning at 8:25 a.m., the shuttle will
- arrive at the VS every 30 minutes (8:25, 8:55, 9:25, etc.)
- Beginning at 8:30 a.m., the shuttle will arrive at CMC every 30 minutes (8:30, 9:00, 9:30, etc.)
- The shuttle bus driver will take lunch from 12:35 to 1:35. (The first CMC drop-off after lunch will be at 2:00.)
- Every 30 minutes, there is a 10-minute period of time when the shuttle can fit in unscheduled stops.
- **UPDATE:** There are no regular stops at CCC, GSC or RV; those will need to be fit in during the unscheduled times.
- Dollar General trips will still take place Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings and Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. A Family Dollar trip will still take place Friday afternoon. Be on the shuttle by 8:15 for the morning trips and 2:15 for the afternoon trips.

The Saturday shuttle schedule will remain the completely on-call from 10:30 a.m. to 12:00 same: noon.

Bake for 12–14 minutes, or until fragrant and toasted. Allow to cool before serving. Keep in airtight container at room temperature for two weeks, or freeze for up to three months.

#### STUFFING OR DRESSING?

Most conversations this time of year seem to revolve around food, like what to serve for Thanksgiving: whether to purchase turkey, ham or roast; and don't forget the green bean casserole or the sweet potato soufflé! But the big question is, will we have stuffing or dressing? Can't have a Thanksgiving meal without ... which one?

The term "dressing", per the History Channel, originated around the 1850s, when the Victorians deemed stuffing too crude for the dish to be named. This happened around the same time that the term "dark meat" began to refer to chicken legs and thighs. Stuffed turkeys and hams were listed as the main courses on early 19th century menus. It seems that stuffing had become a big deal at holiday gatherings.

Today, no American holiday meal is complete without stuffing (or dressing). While playing dominoes Monday night, the conversation turned to favorite holiday foods, with dressing coming out way ahead of the other side dishes. But what about stuffing? A simple explanation is that stuffing is cooked inside the entrée

while dressing is baked as a side dish.

Southern Living did a Google search and found that in 2021, more requests for dressing recipes came from southern states, while requests for stuffing recipes came from primarily northern states. Both stuffing and dressing share some of the same ingredients and there are millions of combinations, whether you enjoy "stuffing" flavored by the rich juices produced inside the cavity or dressing up your plate with a side dish of scrumptious dressing. Have a happy Thanksgiving. Now the next question is ... cornbread or white bread stuffing/dressing?!


