

MEDICARE OPEN ENROLLMENT: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Medicare Open Enrollment is an annual opportunity for Medicare-eligible beneficiaries to make decisions about how to receive their Medicare benefits. Open Enrollment is Oct. 15–Dec. 7 each year. Decisions made during this time will impact Medicare benefits for the next calendar year.

You should consider the following questions as

you evaluate your options:

 Are your providers in the plan's provider network?
 Keep in mind that Good Samaritan Center is NOT in network with Humana Medicare Advantage and ACV Home Care is not in network with some United Health Care Medicare Advantage plans. Original

Medicare allows you to see any doctor or health care provider that accepts Medicare.

2. Are your prescription drugs covered by the plan? If you have original Medicare and do not have other drug coverage, you may need to consider a Part D plan to assist with prescription drug costs.

3. Are prior authorizations or pre-approvals required before you can receive services? Many managed care plans will require authorization before you can

receive services.

Some Medicare Advantage plans from United Health Care will no longer be offered in our area in 2026. If you have AARP Medicare Advantage, please watch for a notice that your coverage will end Dec. 31, 2025, so that you can make decisions about your Medicare coverage.

- Social Security card,
- W-2 form (not handwritten),
- Paycheck/stub, or
- Any 1099 (not handwritten).

Residential Áddress

Bring two (must include your Florida residential address):

- Deed, mortgage agreement, recent monthly mortgage statement, or rental or lease agreement;
- Florida vehicle registration or title; and/or
- Recent utility or medical bill or financial statement. Residency letters issued by ACV are no longer


