SUWANNEE BELLE PONTOON BOAT

The Belle of the Suwannee pontoon boat is available for two regular, 50-minute trips each week on a first-come, first-served basis on Tuesdays and Fridays at 9:30 a.m.

You must reserve a seat ahead of time by calling Member Services at 658-5400. The boat can accommodate up to 10 adult-equivalent passengers per trip, but we need at least four passengers to go. There is no charge for the boat ride, which is only available to ACV members, their guests, and guests of the Conference & Retreat Center. The boat will launch at 9:30 a.m.; if you are late, you could be left behind. The boat launches from the dock behind CCC and returns to the same dock. Please be aware:

- The captain and mate are not to help passengers descend the boat ramp. They will help you on and off the boat, but no more than that.
- The boat ramp can be slippery. Descend with caution and always use the handrails.
- The floating dock can be unstable depending upon weight distribution and in response to the choppi-ness of the river. Remain on the ramp until you are ready to board the boat.
- Do not board the boat unless the captain and/or mate are there to assist you. No one should board the boat without the captain and/or mate present.

ACV QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Do you have a question about the Village you think others would also like to ask? Did you see something curious or hear something you'd like confirmed? Submit your question to Member Services, and we will do our best to find out the answer for you and publish it here. You must include your name with the question because follow-up information may be necessary.

Q: What is a service coordinator?

A: ACV has three service coordinators that serve independent living: Alexis Allen, Ashley Scarborough and Emily Peacock. (GSC has its own service coordinators.) Alexis's office is on the first floor of DH, and Ashley's and Emily's offices are in Member Services. These three ladies are here to help the members assigned to them in a wide range of ways. Every resident living on campus and every off-campus member is assigned to a service coordinator. (If you don't know who your service coordinator is, call Member Services at 658-5400.) Their primary goal is to make sure their members are receiving the care they require by meeting with them at least once a year to evaluate their needs and to talk about how their lives are changing. Between yearly visits, your service coordinator is available to meet with you to help you fill out forms, apply for benefits, inquire about and arrange new services, be a listening ear, answer questions about ACV, discuss medical issues, be a liaison with family members, and much more. If you have a question or problem your service coordinator cannot help you with, they will find someone who can help you. The bottom line is they are here to help in many more ways than what a traditional "social worker" might cover.

SOME DO'S & DON'TS WHEN MEETING A GUIDE DOG

ACV currently has one guide dog living on campus: Sammy, Christine O'Brien's companion. For most people, it's hard to ignore a dog — especially a beautiful one like Sammy — but it's important to remember that Sammy is most likely working when you see her, and if you distract her, it could put Christine at risk. Here are a few do's and don'ts to follow when you see a working guide dog:

- Don't touch, feed, talk to, or otherwise distract the dog while he is wearing his harness or vest.
- Don't give the dog commands. Only its handler can do so.
- Don't walk on the dog's left side as it may become distracted or confused.
- Do walk on the owner's right side but several paces behind her.
- Don't attempt to grab or steer the person while the dog is guiding him or her.
- Do ask if the owner needs your assistance and, if so, offer your left arm.
- Don't give the dog table scraps. Do respect the handler's need to give the dog a balanced diet and to maintain its good habits.
- Don't allow children to tease or abuse the dog.
- Do allow it to rest undisturbed.
- Don't allow your pets to challenge or intimidate a guide dog.
