Once the imposter has formed a connection with an individual, they claim they need money urgently to cover an emergency, deal with a family situation, take advantage of a business opportunity, recover from theft or a stolen identity, or to travel to meet them. Be wary of sending funds to a new friend or romantic interest. Prior to sending money, signing over property or

The HOA Board meeting was Thursday, July 2. I was not present, but some highlights were reported to me.

- Riverwoods now has its own email address: riverwoodshoa23@gmail.com.
- There are other changes concerning the management of Riverwoods, and this information will be sent to all owners later this month.
- Some questions were raised about whether our current documents are legally correct. The association's attorney confirmed, "The Association does have the authority to enforce its current restrictions, as is. They are very much legal and are not obsolete." The attorney also reminded us that "we preserved the Declaration last year, which is significant, as that is required to protect the restrictions and allow the Association to enforce them."
- Regarding the Wilson House: Suwannee County Code Enforcement has issued an Unsafe Structure Notice. It is a 30-day notice; the county will review the situation after the 30 days, and if the family decides to demolish the home, the process could take 90 days. Our attorney recommends that, for the time being, we wait on the county. After the 30 days, we can send them another letter if they have
